Health Team

Project: **Empowering Motherhood**— A wellness event focused on prenatal care and resources for expectant mothers and families. This no-cost event was held on May 10th and included a "baby shower" for expectant mothers and mothers with children under 6 months of age. 21 vendors participated in the event which was held at Girls Inc. All 26 attendees each received a diaper bag filled with supplies and there were several other baby items and raffle items given away as well.









Community Growth/Awareness Team

Project: Seymour Parks & Recreation Guide— The team created a guide to help families and the community to discover local parks and recreation activities. Project: Crossroads of Culture— The group teamed up with the Seymour City Youth Council to host a "Crossroads of Culture" event. The event was held April 5th at Seymour Middle School. Community groups were offered a chance to bring an engaging booth to showcase characteristics within their respective cultures in an environment that was safe, fun, educational, and open to everyone. There were over 150 attendees at this event in its inaugural year.









History Team

Project: **The Forgotten**– This project focused on seeking out forgotten and unique historic places and aspects of each township in Jackson County including: Jackson, Redding, Carr, Brownstown, Driftwood, Salt Creek, Grassy Fork, Hamilton, Owen, Pershing, Vernon, and Washington townships. A booklet is being printed and will be made available to the public at the Jackson County Public Library, Jackson County Visitor Center, and TA Travel Center in Seymour.

Seymour Freeman Field Municipal

Airport is owned by the City of Seymour and operated under the direction of the Airport Authority Board. Freeman Field was built during WWII and served as a twin-engine training facility for pilots during the war. It has been named to the list of Historical Sites in Indiana. The Freeman Army Airfield Museum, located across the street from the airport, is dedicated to sharing the history of Freeman Field. The airport remains operational with four runways that can land a variety of aircrafts. Colin Smith is the Airport Manager.



Jackson County Community Theatre began performances in 1971, before they had a dedicated building. The Royal Off-The-Square Theatre was rented by the organization beginning in 1974 and purchased in 1980. Annually, the theatre produces five play per year at the Royal, plus a dinner theatre at The Pines Evergreen Room in Seymour. Southern Indiana Center for the Arts (SICA) is a not-for-profit organization that provides art education and enjoyment to the surrounding communities, both in a gallery and studio environment. SICA was originally established in 1990 by John Mellencamp and offers many programs throughout the year. Members receive discounts on classes and art supplies, while helping to provide tax-deductible financial support to SICA. Silas Cheo is the current Executive Director. Seymour City Hall operates in what was formerly the Southern Indiana Telephone and Telegraph Company. Built in 1929, the building's architecture is an attention-grabber in its downtown location. Within City Hall, the Johnson Meeting Room has been utilized as a space for our LJC classes as well as board meetings when our usual meeting spaces are not available. This year, flooding prevented the LJC class from visiting the Jackson County Learning Center, so they finished their daily reflection at City Hall.



Cummins Seymour Engine Plant allowed this year's class to take a tour of their facility and many were surprised and impressed by how clean the facility is, even in the manufacturing area. Cummins SEP produces high-horsepower engines including the company's largest diesel engine. The company is mindful of the environmental impact of their products and have shared that their goal is for their products to produce zero emissions by 2050. Cummins is a major employer in Jackson County employing over 1,000 people at its Seymour location.





LJC class members took a tour of **Seymour High School** and learned about the educational pathways that are currently being offered. SHS offers 34 Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses including areas such as construction, agriculture, welding, manufacturing, engineering, nursing, and other fields. They also offer dual credit college course options in partnership with Ivy Tech and Vincennes University. The school not only encourages project-based learning, but also service-based learning opportunities through participation in a school sport or club, and/or work-based learning through internships or paid positions for high school seniors. The goal is for Seymour High School students to be well-prepared to enter the local workforce, attend college or trade school, or enlist in military service upon graduation. Students have the opportunity to graduate with experience that often qualifies them for higher-level positions than they would otherwise have without these educational pathways.
